Milestone for a true champion

IT would be remiss of me if I did not offer a pat on the back to my old Carlton team-mate Stephen Kernahan, who chalked up 200 AFL games with the Blues last weekend.

When I went over to play my first season with Carlton Kernahan was already there and was appointed skipper that year - at the ripe old age of 23. Today he is the Blues' longestserving skipper and nine-times leading goalkicker.

Kernahan is a giant of the game and an inspiration not only to his team, but to all South Australians who have followed his football career. He is a charismatic leader who always gives 100 per cent on and off the track.

I believe Kernahan has at least a further two or three seasons left at the top level, and Carlton will continue to look

He would be the first to admit his groundwork is ordinary, so what he attempts to do when the ball hits the turf is to knock it on to a team-mate.


