Young guns shine

LENELG has the chance to put its new-found resolve to the sternest test on Saturday, with a daunting second-round matchup against Port Adelaide at Alberton.

Inspired by teenagers Kane Cornes and Laurence Angwin, the Tigers mounted a stirring second-half comeback to record a 16-point win in Brenton Honor's first match as coach at Glenelg Oval on Saturday.

And the qualities of desperation, commitment and self-belief Glenelg showed to halt a settled, in-form Sturt in Saturday's second-half are exactly what it will need to be competitive against the Magpies.

"That's the measuring stick, Port Adelaide at Alberton," Honor said. "But that attribute of courage is how you beat Port at Alberton and

these guys did that today."

Glenelg, tipped to be a big improver after taking out the wooden spoon last year, improved markedly in the second half after allowing Sturt to find space all over the ground in the second quarter. The Tigers' resolve to overcome a 21-point half-time deficit and run away with the game into the breeze in the last term was something rarely displayed by the 2000 outfit.

Remarkably, it was two 18-yearolds who hauled Glenelg back into the game after Sturt midfielders Bruce Lennon and Tim Weatherald ran riot in the first half.

Cornes, showing great confidence and maturity after a full pre-season with the Power, was the game's only four-quarter player, cleaning up in defence before moving into the midfield to generate some drive from the centre squares. A nine-kick, threegoal last quarter topped off his best game of senior footy.

Angwin, thrown into the ruck in the third term, showed the athleticism and skill that made him Adelaide's top draft pick last October.

"I thought Kane was fantastic. He has taken his game to another level," Honor said. "Laurie has been threatening with this. He took some big

"We get into the rooms and get a false sense of security perhaps and we just relax rather than keep up the intensity that we finished that second quarter off with," Carman said.



The Bloods have more accomplished SANFL performers and far more body weight and height. Greg Mellor and Tim Symes have been state forwards while Ben Hollands, Dion Myles, Paul Koulouriotis and Dean Howard have reached the AFL. West needs every win it can get
