DESPITE trailing until the 24-minute mark of the last term, Central District came away with a heart-stopping two-point win over an unlucky Glenelg at Glenelg Oval yesterday.

A quick snap out of traffic 30m from goal by Rick Macgowan put the Dogs in front, simultaneously ripping out the heart of the Tiger faithful who were excited at the prospect of their team pulling off the upset of the season.

This came soon after a skilful goal on the boundary from captain Danny Healy, who had a fine last term, and finished as the Bulldogs leading scorer with three goals.

Prior to this the Bays made full use of a strong breeze in the opening stanza, slamming on six goals while keeping the two-time premier scoreless.

Failing to score into the wind eventually cost the Bays, who tried admirably to cling to a lead for just the club's third victory of the season.

A goal to Danny Healy, following a slick Matthew Slade handball at the 26-minute mark of the third quarter, enabled the Dogs to do exactly that and could have proved to be the only difference between the two sides on the day.


