

GLENELG stormed to its eighth straight win yesterday with a come-frombehind 18-point homeground victory over Port Adelaide Magpies.

The Tigers fought back after trailing for the first half to grab another two premiership points, strengthening their grip on top of the ladder. It was a gutsy showing in front of a boisterous bumper crowd of 7711, which expected the Bays to dig deep when it looked like Port could still win the game in the last quarter.

They did just that.

A disgraceful third quarter lost the Magpies the game and they failed to follow it up with the immense amount of skill and ferocity needed to control the Tigers again.

Star midfielder Jeremy Clayton managed only four possessions in the second half – one kick in the third – which was representative of the team's slump.

Glenelg ran free in the third quarter and claimed a six-goal turnaround, led by ruckman Trevor Cranston and midfielder John Hinge. However, the Bays could have closed the game much earlier with more accurate conversion and increased pressure in the opening stages of the clash.

Tigers coach Mark Mickan said the team was prepared for a tough game from a "desperate" Port.

And despite not putting in a full four-quarter effort, he was pleased the players "stuck at it and maintained discipline".

# Blues on rampage

REMEMBER back to the opening four rounds and the irrepressible form of the Sturt Football Club. Even back to the trials.

Those were the early days when the Double Blues were sensational, smashing sides apart with a highly attractive, high-energy style of football.

When the 21 players worked as a single unit to force sides into submission with class and a desperate work ethic.

If North Adelaide has a short memory it was given a not so subtle reminder at Unley yesterday, crushed by 106 points by a Sturt side hungry for action after a three-week lay-off.

The Double Blues went on the rampage from the opening quarter to have the game by the throat with a seven-goal buffer going into the second term.

There was no way back for the Roosters as Sturt piled on seven goals in the second quarter, six in the third and six in the last. And to think seven of the Roosters' 10 goals came from free kicks.

"The first four weeks were impressive and this is right up there," Sturt coach Rick Macgowan said. "Sometimes a side can get some pride back by winning the last quarter when you tend to relax with that type of lead. It was important we had the courage to really push on and finish the game off on a high."

The trend of the day was established early as Sturt was vastly superior with its foot skills, getting numbers to the contest and rushing the ball forward in waves. And the clean delivery in finding targets deep in attack was unrelenting.

Veteran ruckman Simon Feast was brilliant and the likes of Adam Thomson and Jade Sheedy constantly drove the ball forward from stoppages. Power coach Mark Williams, you were wrong not to play Thomson on Sunday.

Andrew Whiteman was inspirational in defence, Tristan Gum was outstanding across half-forward against his old club while Michael Coad and Brant Chambers gave the Roosters' defence night-mares. Some of Coad's efforts even had the Sturt coaching staff applauding.

Magarey Medallist James Allan got his hands to plenty of ball with a typically tireless display but he had too many mates as passengers. Some Roosters
