On Saturday there were 11,827 fans packed into Glenelg Oval to watch the eight-point win over Sturt. Almost 8000 supporters watched the Tigers beat the Port Adelaide Magpies at the same ground on the Monday of the June long weekend.

Saturday's crowd was the biggest at the ground since the inception of the Crows in 1991 and the biggest SANFL minorround attendance since 2001.

There were more people crammed into the Bay ground on Saturday than attended the AFL games that night in Darwin (Port Adelaide versus the Western Bulldogs) and on the Gold Coast (North Melbourne v St Kilda).

The re-emergence of Glenelg as a SANFL power has not been an overnight phenomenon, nor is it a fluke.

Stability with well-planned decision-making off-field is the cornerstone to leading sporting organisations.

Success rarely just happens. Since Graham Cornes' time with the Tigers ended in 1990 there have been 10 coaches. That included Peter Simmons, who lasted just three-quarters of the 2005 season before being sacked.

Publicly that was a dark time for the club. Discontent among members prompted the board to resign and a new team was installed to direct the club's future.

STURT coach Rick Macgowan concedes he sensed victory sliding in the opening minutes of the last quarter as Glenelg turned the tide at the Bay on Saturday.

In front of a massive 11,827 crowd, the Double Blues controlled the dour contest in the middle quarters and led the blockbuster by 10 points at the last change.

But Glenelg - shuffled by percentage to second on the ladder before the weekend kicked the only three goals of the final term at the nonscoring northern end to break Sturt's hold and claw out a 10th successive win.

"You could see five minutes in there was only one side that was going to win the game," Macgowan said. "Glenelg were really taking the game on, we were stagnant with our movement and probably didn't have the courage in the end to take the game on.

"That's not the way we play and it cost us in the end.

"I'm not sure why. Our midfielders probably tired at the end and Glenelg took advantage of that and got clean ball away from the stoppages which meant they got a lot more ball inside 50.

There was plenty of emotion on the ground – youngster **Tom Holmes** celebrated both of his match-winning goals by pumping his fist and leaping into the air.



"It was a battle. I thought we started okay but we dropped right off in the second term," Glenelg coach Mark Mickan said.


"They forced some errors and got right on top.


"That was a very good character win for our blokes."

GLENELG has moved to secure several big-name players for next season as its 22-year premiership drought shows signs of breaking.

Magarey Medallist Brett Backwell, captain Ben Mules and forward Todd Grima are among eight League players out of contract at the end of this season.

According to Glenelg boss
