Two hours before the opening bounce the Tigers huddled as a tight group in the middle of Adelaide Oval. Already the adrenalin would have been pumping.


The Tigers refused to release team changes to The Advertiser 40 minutes before the game as is usual practice during the season. The players were sitting as a group listening intently in a changeroom exploding with tension.

Next door some Bulldogs were joking with favourite son John Platten, a former champion servant of the club and Hawthorn. Players went about their business as they would on a Saturday in June.

And that is how the game opened. The Bulldogs were composed, switched on and desperately hunting in packs.

In contrast, the Tigers appeared nervous as they slipped 19 points down midway through the opening quarter. The Tigers did well to cut the lead to one point late in the term and then hit the front late in the second.

THEY'VE seen and done it all before but the Gowans twins are far from resting on their laurels.

Arguably the glue that keeps the Central District midfield stuck together in tough times, Chris and James are ecstatic to have made their ninth consecutive grand final.

It is the scenario that may not have been. Chris was restricted to the sidelines for 15 weeks this season with a knee injury and may not have made it back.

But James is the first to sing his brother's praises and is stoked to have him back on field in the red, blue and white.

"With Chris getting back it definitely helps the side. He brings a bit more experience and a bit more grunt in the midfield. We'll just get out there and really enjoy this one because you never know, it could be our last," James said.

However, the audacious nature they display when they pull on the football boots is not extended to off the field. They are selfless about the opportunity ahead and know what a seventh premiership would mean to the club.

"It's probably one of the sweetest times to get into the grand final purely because of the fact everyone wrote us off at the start of the year and even six weeks ago no-one gave us a chance," Chris said.

"But we won't be trying to win it for us, we'll be trying to win it for the club and the supporters. It's got nothing to do with the two of us," James said.

They are two of only three players to have lined up for the eight Bulldogs grand finals, the other being co-captain Matthew Slade. So they are familiar with the excitement, nerves and pressure that goes hand-inhand with slugging it out for a premiership.

They believe Central is in good stead to come out firing in a fortnight's time.

"We've got a game style that just suits finals football. We put a lot of pressure on and that's probably why we've been so successful," James said. "Now we can sit back and have a great weekend, train really hard, refresh the batteries and have a crack at it in two weeks' time," Chris said.
