

Matthew Snook and Sam Lonergan got their hands to plenty of ball to provide the spark in the engine room.



As was the case in the loss to Norwood last week, the Bulldogs lacked authority in attack and had issues with skills finishing off deep in the forward line. That aided the Tigers defence and it was able to constantly defuse Bulldogs raids.

It took II minutes into the second quarter for the Bulldogs to register their first goal. They needed only 30 seconds to grab their second. Four minutes later they had a third.

The Bulldogs upped the ante in the third quarter with their fierce, relentless attack on the body and ball and they were richly rewarded.

The Tigers responded in the fourth term - but couldn't bridge the gap.

Honour board recognises more than just the select few like a Hall of Fame

S the Adelaide Football Club prepares to honour a privileged few at its inaugural Hall of Fame dinner next week, a much more modest affair at Glenelg Oval last night celebrated football's most important principle. Team!

The Glenelg Football Club last night unveiled its Wall of Fame.

It is a massive honour board fixed to the northern end of the main change-

On it are the names of every player who has played for the Bays.

Be it Ray Hinton for his one game in 1960 or Peter

Carey for his 448 games over 18 years, their names are there.

One thousand and sixtyone names, including Bryce Woolard who played his first game for the Ti- onblack. gers last night,

are there in gold on black.

It has been an incredible feat of historical research, undertaken by Peter Cornwall, who collaborated with several other football historians, to identify and collate the names and the dates.

The project developed from the one simple premise: any one who has been good enough to play a game for the Glenelg Football Club deserves to be recognised.

That, of course, is the one major flaw with Halls of Fame.

The privileged few are recognised, their records and reputations are preserved for football posterity, and the others, who at any one moment could have been vital to a club's success, fade into the shadows of a club's history.

Every name means something different to those looking at it.

Some leap off the board, others are more modest, but every one has a story to tell.

There are three Test cricketers up there: Merv Waite, David Sincock, and one of the greatest of all: player number 276, Keith Ross Miller, who made his debut in 1942.

There are so many untold stories, particularly in this week leading up to ANZAC
