GLENELG overcame an indifferent performance to pull off a massive escape act with a two-point victory over plucky Central District at Glenelg Oval on Saturday.

The Tigers, facing a 23-point deficit late in the third quarter, were behind on the scoreboard for all but the final seconds, with Lachie Hosie snapping the winning goal.

But while the Tigers will take winning form into the elimination final against Sturt following an eighth successive win over the Bulldogs, there are significant questions over their form.

The Bulldogs threw everything, including the kitchen sink, at Glenelg and will rue missed opportunities in front of goal, especially in the opening quarter,

for failing to claim their first win over the Tigers in four years.

"It is good to win ugly," Glenelg coach Brett Hand said. "At this time of the year, a win is a win."

"We put things in place and to see them execute and stick it out, and do what we planned, what we practice and train, the leaders stand up and the communication was pleasing to see."

"They have had a really good second half of the year and we knew it was going to be a contest."

"Our boys kept some belief and that is important at this time of year."

Central brought the heat from the outset, with its tackling pressure creating plenty of turnover ball and putting the Tigers' defence under siege.

Veteran Justin Hoskin was outstanding in defence for the Bulldogs

and ruckman Billy McCormack had a heavy influence. Inaccuracy has been an issue for the visitors, however, having scored 27.46 in their previous four games and it again proved a massive concern in the first term.

Then it was Glenelg's turn to butcher chances, dropping easy marks deep in attack in the second quarter and adding only two behinds from 12 entries inside 50. There were six goals in the first half, but 17 in the second, when gun forward Liam McBean's impact in ruck sparked the Tigers. Down back, Tigers captain Max Proud celebrated his 150th appearance with his trademark reliability.

"When you lead for 112 minutes of 113 you have done a lot right," Bulldogs coach Paul Thomas said.

"We will look to make sure we acknowledge what we did well."

good reward for him for the pressure he applied throughout the game.

Fortunately, we were able to sneak away with the win at the end of the last quarter, hitting the front with about a minute to go and managing to hold on. What was pleasing in that last little bit is we talked about some structural things that the boys were able to put in place for the last two to three minutes of the game.

It was an ugly way to win, but still a great way to celebrate club captain Max Proud in his 150th game. He's been a true servant of the club and we look forward to going further in the finals.
