# Bays three from three after blitz

THE comeback kings have done it again.

Just a week after overcoming a 34-point deficit against Sturt, Glenelg has produced another stunning comeback, rallying from 41 points down to defeat Adelaide by 15 points at Glenelg Oval.

The Tigers produced a stunning third quarter, slamming on 10 goals to none as they turned a 40-point half-time deficit into a 20-point advantage by threequarter-time.

After struggling in the first half, Glenelg's midfield, led by Luke Partington and Brett Turner, took control of the contest, seizing the momentum, with a young Crows side unable to recover. Adelaide did kick the first goal of the final term to close the margin to 14 points but Glenelg had all the answers to secure the win and finish round 3 as the only unbeaten side in the competition.

Turner was instrumental for Glenelg, racking up 38 disposals and booting four second-half goals in a best-on-ground display.

He was well supported by 2019 Magarey Medallist Luke Partington, who amassed 40 disposals and five clearances, while key forward Liam McBean also booted four goals for the Tigers.

It was an impressive response from Glenelg against an Adelaide side which dominated the first half.

The Crows booted seven goals to none in the second term, highlighted by slick ball movement and a pressure game which Glenelg struggled to match.

However, the inexperienced Adelaide line-up was unable to halt the Tigers' momentum as the game wore on.

Key forward Riley Thilthorpe continued to push his claims for an AFL recall, booting four goals, while ruckman Kieran Strachan was again impressive with 19 disposals, 45 hit-outs and a goal. Axed midfielder Harry Schoenberg was quiet on his return to SANFL footy, finishing with just 19 touches.
