## Roosters turn back time in vintage win

A CLASSIC. Spectators at Prospect saw first-hand what is great about the SANFL product when North Adelaide and Glenelg produced a game for the ages.

On a day when North paid tribute to its 100th anniversary of games at Prospect Oval it took a goal from a free kick to Aaron Young, 25 minutes into the last quarter to give the Roosters the lead and victory by two points.

In a game of fluctuating fortunes and highlights by the bucket load - looking at you Keenan Ramsey, Young and Hugh Stagg - it was impossible to pick a winner until the final siren. Victory gave North a 5-1 count, while the Bays are 4-2 after losing the past two games by less than a kick.

There were stars galore for both sides with Harrison Wigg delivering something special for the Roosters with 44 possessions (12 inside 50s, eight clearances) and Ramsey kicking some clutch goals, with five after quarter-time.

Glenelg had its moments with skipper Max Proud again a rock deep in defence with eight marks and the always gutsy Matt Snook doing his best to fire up his team.

The Bays jumped to a flyer in the first quarter to lead 5.1 to 1.4 after Liam McBean kicked two goals and had a hand in a couple of others.

But the Roosters hit back in the second quarter, after trailing by 27 points, with five unanswered goals, a Glenelg turnover early in the second seemingly sparking the home side into a dominant period before the Bays kicked two late goals to lead by 10 points at half-time.

North's goalkicking radar was bang on target as it booted 11 straight goals from quarter-time to three-quartertime but Glenelg turned for home two points ahead and looking the better side midway through the last quarter with a 12-point lead before the Roosters rallied late.

North coach Jacob Surjan



said it was an outstanding game.

"We were challenged many times by Glenelg. Their intensity was above where we needed to be," Surjan said.

"A win like that is more about the character of the group than the win. We executed a few thing we had worked on during pre-season. I could not be more proud of the guys against a very good side. To go into the break with five wins and one loss is a great result."

Glenelg coach Brett Hand said there were many good areas to focus on but he said the second quarter was poor.

"We are doing a lot right and had a very good start,"

Hand said. "But we went into our shell in the second quarter and conceded six goals which wasn't good enough. They got us out the back.

"We responded from there but didn't take chances when we should have. We have played six very good sides but we need to do better."

North Adelaide's 100-year

celebration of games at Prospect Oval has been a terrific promotion in the lead-up in various forms of media.

But the ground announcer, in among his centenary fun facts, won the ambitious award saying, "for those who remember that game on May 8, 1922, North won by 25 points".
