Wilson's class and brute strength lead Sturt to stunning opening

STURT'S relentless pressure and ability to convert more chances in attack proved the difference in its victory against Glenelg at Unley Oval on Saturday.

Celebrating a rewarding offseason with their new-look Jack Oatey Stand, the Double Blues took charge on the ground to win by 31 points, ending a three-year losing run against the Tigers.

Patrick Wilson, if he can keep injury free, should be a major factor for Sturt this season. A touch of class, brute strength and ability to produce a game lifter was evident. It summed up his and his team's day with his third goal on the siren to end the game. Usual suspect James Battersby was another key player, while former AFL speedster Marty Frederick featured with two goals and plenty of run.

Early on it was a struggle for both sides and the first 20 minutes of the second quarter provided plenty of turnovers by hand and foot. But Sturt turned around its fortunes with three late goals, led by Wilson, to lead by 17 points at the long break. Dominating the early part of the third quarter, Sturt pushed out the lead to 29 points before Glenelg kicked two quick goals to look back in the game. But that was short-lived as a flurry of Blues goals followed.

Sturt coach Marty Mattner said it was an excellent kick-off to the season for his side with plenty of upside, the early mistakes more the heat from both teams.

"It was a contested and hot game of footy," Mattner said. "It was a good, tough win. The Bays have been a very good side in the past five years so we knew we had to bring the pressure. There were errors but I thought it was the pressure.

"They (Glenelg) were chasing the game a bit, so we knew we had to keep attacking and putting on the pressure. We had a number of good players but Wilson was something special."

Former Brisbane player Connor McFadyen and Liam Puncher debuted for Sturt and played well.

For the Bays it was largely a dirty day. One highlight, though, was a series of strong marks from defence in the last quarter which resulted in a mark and goal to Luke Reynolds.

But the side stuck to its guns to threaten in the last quarter. Coach Darren Reeves, in his first game as senior coach, said his side kept at it but was hurt by turnovers and at times by some areas of discipline.

"All credit to Sturt, they outhunted us and deserved to win," Reeves said. "We were a bit undisciplined at times and turnovers hurt us. We had chances to score but couldn't."
