The Tigers upped the ante in the race for the flag when they absolutely smashed previously top-of-the ladder Sturt by an incredible 105 points in a stunning performance at the Bay on Monday.

The game was billed as the clash of the heavyweights but it was nothing of the sort as the Tigers tore the Double Blues apart in emphatic fashion.

This was one of those days for Glenelg, when very, very little goes wrong.

And the Bays benefited from facing an opponent which just did not turn up for the occasion. Sturt might not like to read it but it was simply woeful.

"I knew we were going OK but I did not think we were going that well," Tigers coach Darren Reeves said. "I'm not sure they were at their best today but I did not feel we allowed them to be at their best.


"I felt we were on right from the start, the way we defended we took away how they were able to move the footy. And we were able to execute from that.

"We have been building and really clear on how we want to play and how we want to defend."

The signs were ominous from the outset when the disciplined Tigers, with the strong wind at their backs for the opening quarter, went on the attack with damaging, clean movement.

They worked hard to create space and an option for teammates and, importantly, kicked goals from every angle. This set the tone for the entire contest.

With a regular supply of quality delivery, Glenelg's Matthew Allen, Lachlan Hosie and Liam McBean had plenty of fun.

Even when the Double Blues had possession, the Tigers refused to relax the pressure and their relentless defensive work created opportunities. They constantly had more numbers at the contest.

In contrast, Sturt hardly gave a whimper – outworked, outplayed, out-everything.

Tackling machine Tom Lewis, the Blues' best player this season, was missing because of an ankle injury. That does not explain that poor, poor effort.

"We did not start well and it was downhill from there," Sturt coach Marty Mattner said. "It was one of those games where nothing goes right. Credit to Glenelg, that is the best I have seen a team in a long, long time.

"They were very good all around the ground."

Glenelg was simply majestic on the King's Birthday, catapulting to first place on the Hostplus SANFL League ladder with a 105-point demolition of Sturt at Stratarama Stadium.

The top-of-the-table clash, billed as the match of the year, was one-way traffic from the outset as the Tigers, explosively and emphatically, made it eight victories in a row while terminating the previously undefeated Double Blues' own eight-game winning streak.

The Bays had the bumper public holiday crowd of 7285 in raptures as they slammed seven goals in each of the opening three terms to firm as premiership favourites at the season's halfway point.

Matthew Allen, the last-ditch match-winner a week earlier against Adelaide, lorded over Sturt with six goals and 27 disposals.

Lachlan Hosie, the competition's leading goalscorer, booted four majors from his first four kicks, while three-time Ken Farmer Medallist Liam McBean and fifth-gamer Will Chandler chimed in with three apiece.

Luke Partington (31 touches), Corey Lyons (27) and Matt Snook (27) were all prolific, while captain Max Proud and Toby Pink piloted an air-tight defence.

Glenelg's seven-goal headstart kicking towards the Primary School end was a virtual highlights reel, underlined by Cameron McGree's monster goal from inside the centre-square and McBean's 60m bomb, both big men capitalising on Sturt errors.

Jonty Scharenberg's one-handed, lunging, chasedown tackle of Josh Hone showed the Tigers also meant business at the other end.

Hone finally slotted the Blues' first goal after the quarter-time siren but any hopes of a fightback were quickly erased in the opening 30 seconds of the second stanza when Chandler shrugged off attempted tackles from James Battersby and Casey Voss, sold candy to Joe Thiele and threaded the needle.

Chandler converted again moments later as the Bay train continued to motor along imperiously.

Glenelg led by 65 points at half-time despite the fact Sturt, with Amos Doyle tireless in ruck, led the hit-outs 30-4.

It was more of the same in the third period, during which Pink, playing his 50th game, almost provided the biggest highlight in a match full of them, with an intercept and launch from beyond 70m, which was just touched as it bounced through the goals.

Hosie snapped his fourth to extend the margin to triple-digits before Allen outmarked Connor McFadyen and nailed his fifth right on the three-quarter-time siren, then added another one to his tally in the fourth.

Battersby (29 disposals, nine clearances) toiled away in a Sturt midfield which sorely missed injured dynamo Tom Lewis, while McFadyen and Voss combined for 15 rebound-50s in a backline which was savaged from start to finish.

# Toby tickled Pink

HE is remembered for kicking the most famous behind in SANFL under-18s history.

Now, seven years after his after-the-siren long bomb miraculously bounced past 11 North Adelaide players in the southern goalsquare at Adelaide Oval to secure Glenelg an amazing one-point grand final win, Toby Pink is making a big name for himself at league level.

He has been so good this season that first-year Tigers coach Darren Reeves declared he is "the best key defender in the competition".

"Every single week, he has got the job done for us," Reeves said of his powerful, red-headed backman.

"Toby's a quiet, unassuming lad but he's a competitive beast who has had an outstanding season.

"He plays on the best (opposition) forward week in, week out, and his ability to be able to win those battles and also win the ball and be really efficient with it has been terrific."

Pink, who was selected by Sydney in the 2016 rookie draft following his under-age grand final heroics and spent three years on its list without playing an AFL game before returning to Glenelg, has been a tower of strength in the Tigers' sevengame winning streak.

Considered unlucky not to have made the state team, the 24-year-old has rarely had his colours lowered in one-on-one contests while averaging 12 disposals and five marks.

"I've enjoyed being able to settle down back this season," said the 194cm, 94kg Pink, who returned to the Bay from the Swans in 2021.

"I've been thrown around a fair bit in the past couple of years, being used as a swingman up forward, in the ruck and down back, and I've loved being given that permanent challenge of taking the opposition key forward out of the game and helping my teammates get the win.

"Reeva (Reeves) tells me every Monday who I'm going to get the following week, so it allows me to prepare well and do my homework on them.

"I really enjoy that challenge and have the competitive mindset to beat my player because I hate losing."

While Pink has enjoyed a standout season, he is often reminded of his famous behind after video of his kick went viral. With scores level, Pink marked 60m from goal when the siren sounded and while his long kick fell short, landing at the top of the goalsquare, it somehow eluded Roosters players, making him an instant hero.

"That video often pops up on the (social media) feed," Pink said.

"I was expecting the game to go into extra-time and for the kick to somehow bounce through from where it landed

was pretty unbelievable.

"To kick the winning score after the final siren in a grand final is every kid's dream and it definitely got my name out there."

Born in Millicent, part of Glenelg's south-east recruiting zone, Pink will be put to the test again when the second-placed Tigers play top-of-the-table Sturt in a blockbuster King's Birthday clash at the Bay on Monday.

The Double Blues are unbeaten, having won their first eight games this season, while Glenelg's only loss came against them at Unley in round one.

"They are a quality team so it will be a big test for us but one

we are really looking forward to," said Pink, who will line up for his 50th league game.

The SANFL is hoping the "Super Match", presented in partnership with The Advertiser and featuring a roadshow of off-field activities, including mini-golf, face-painters, inflatable footy games and free haircuts, will attract a crowd of about 10,000.

The day will also be used to raise money for South Australians suffering from Motor Neurone Disease, with a "Dunk me for MND' challenge, while three lucky fans will have the chance to win \$10,000 in a 'Kick for Cash' promotion on the oval.
